BROTHERS LEFT HIM IN WORST SITUATIONS, RESULTS IN SAMEER WORKING AS A CHILD LABOR

This story is about a 12 years old boy, Sameer, who left his school and got indulged in child laboring for his family's survival and took all the responsibilities on him. Let us tell you why he left his school and became a victim of child laboring. Sameer lives in a new house with his family. There are 8 members in his family- 6 brother-sisters and his parents. During his past, when he lovingly used to study and go to school, his father used to pull rickshaw and mother was a laborer. With time, his mother got diseases like Cholera (heza) and his father started drinking alcohol in his mother's tension. At present, his father is an addict of alcohol. He used to drink alcohol and sleep on roadside area and he continuously says one thing that is "Somebody please help me so that I can cure my wife". Seeing such bad situation, his 4 elder brothers, who are married, left his family and decided to stay



separated from them. Due to this, his mother's health was getting worse day by day. At that time, looking at his mother's

One of our journalists saw Sandhya, begging at small railway stations in Bihar. Sandhya is a 12 years old girl, who lives in Samastipur village, Bihar with her family. When our reporter saw such a small girl begging he went to her and tried to interact with her. He asked her, "Why are you begging at such a young age?" Sandhya replied, from the morning it's now the afternoon and still we have not got anything to eat. We are craving for hunger." Telling more about how they manage to eat, he further added, "There is a market near us, there is a huge mall in that market, where the outsiders come to buy things. When they buy some food to eat and

throw the rest of the

food into the trash

we go and pick up that rest food from the dustbin and eat the same food and this is how we fill our stomach. Sadly, some guards of this market are very bad. They run towards us to beat us from his stick. That's why we keep roaming around

so that we can get something to eat. In order to fight from his hunger situations, we started begging in our past, but the public did not give us money rather they asks us that don't we have anything to do except begging also they says that it's our daily occupation. In such bad situation what we children can do?

Apart from wandering, we don't have anything else for our survival. Sometimes, we are forced to steal in order to fulfil our stomach. This hunger taught us to steal."

CHILDREN ARE BEING PREYED BY FOUL SMELL

Th is news is about a place, whose name has been kept secret, with eight hundred slums. Some people living in these slums are from Bengal and Jhansi. Th ey work as a laborer and rag picker for their survival. During the survey, one of our journalists got to know that there is a huge drain in this slum, which is very deep and unsafe. Children living there said that there is always some accident happening in this drain. Another weird thing our journalist got to know was that people living in the slums have made toilets near the drain with cloths and tarpaulin and children and parents themselves use it on regular basis. A 15 years old girl, Khushi (name changed) said, "Along with the accidents problem, another problem we have to face due to this dirty drain is its intolerable foul smell. Our slum is at very less distance from this drain. When somebody uses these toilets, the excreta directly go into the drain due to which drain smells very bad.

At times while eating food, we feel like vomiting due to foul odor. People even throw dead animals in this drain only, which is also a reason for its foul smell." Telling more about their problems, another 16 years old girl, Anju (name changed) said, "We children want that some strict actions should be taken as soon as possible because due to this drain, we children fall sick on a regular basis. Whenever we go to the doctor, he advice us to change our living area in order to get rid off the disease." Expressing their worries and telling about their compulsions, a 43 years old lady, Mrs. Komal Devi (name changed) said, "Even if want to move from this place, we cannot due to money problems. How will we survive? In the area we are living a present, is a developing area and also we get a huge amount of rash and wastes very easily." Keeping a positive thought ahead she further added, "Our parents say that our prime minister, Mr. Narendra Modi Ji is making toilets for all the poor people likewise he will also make toilets for us also so that we can use it with our families."
